The Catholic Lighthouse to be reduced!

Chancery needs to hear from you if you wish to continue receiving newspaper

The Diocese of Victoria wants to be sure parishioners are receiving their Catholic diocesan news in the most economical, technological and "green" way.

Beginning with this issue (January 2012), the diocesan newspaper, The Catholic Lighthouse, will become "greener and leaner".

The Diocese of Victoria will begin printing a smaller, more lightweight newspaper, reducing its pages from 20 to 12 in an effort to reduce costs and the amount of paper it uses. By shortening the paper, it will use fewer resources and weigh less, thus cost less to mail it to each Catholic residence in the Diocese of Victoria.

The savings of printing and mailing a 12-page newspaper, compared to a 20-page paper, is nearly \$17,000 per year.

Also, because originally *The* Catholic Lighthouse was mandated to go to each and every Catholic family registered to a parish in the diocese, nearly 19,000 papers are mailed out each month. Over a 12-month period, the postage costs come to nearly \$30,000 annually.

In an effort to streamline the distribution of the newspaper, the chancery office would like to mail the paper only to parishioners who wish to receive one in hardcopy (paper) form.

Those who would prefer to use today's technology and read the paper solely on the diocesan website, may do so at http:// www.victoriadiocese.org - often times days before the paper would arrive at one's door.

In order to help the chancery get The Catholic Lighthouse to those who really enjoy receiving it, we need to hear from each and every family as to whether or not they wish to continue receiving the paper by mail.

If you would still like to continue receiving the diocesan newspaper in the mail, as opposed to reading it in "PDF format" on the diocesan website, please forward your name, address and phone number to the chancery office at (361) 573-0828 or send

an electronic form by going to www.victoriadiocese.org and clicking on the "RENEW YOUR SUBSCRIPTION TODAY" link on the homepage. You may also fill out the registration card that will be included in this year's Diocesan Services Appeal (DSA), which you will be receiving in the mail soon.

Notification must be received in the chancery office by March 31 if you wish to continue receiving The Catholic Lighthouse.



Diocese celebrates the Rite of **Ordination for two deacons**

Two permanent deacons have been called to the diaconate for the Diocese of Victoria.

On Saturday morning, December 17, 2011, Kenneth Wayne Fishbeck of St. Joseph's Church in Moulton and Larry Wayne Koether of Holy Cross Church in Bay City were ordained by the Most Rev. David E. Fellhauer at the 10 a.m. Mass at Our Lady of Victory Cathedral in Victoria.

The ordination celebration was truly a family affair as a daughter of each deacon was a lector for the Mass; Jackie Fishbeck Horras read the first reading, Jeremiah 1:4-9, and Jessica Koether read 1 Tm. 3:8-10, 12-13a. Also, the deacons' spouses, Mrs. Lynn Koether and Mrs.

Kathy Fishbeck, assisted their husbands with the investiture of the deacon's stole and dalmatic, as well as presented the gifts.

Twelve deacons from throughout the diocese, as well as transitional deacon Patrick Knippenberg, honored Deacons Fishbeck and Koether with their presence at the ordination Mass, and Deacon John McCourt of Queen of the Holy Rosary Parish in Hostyn was the Deacon of the Word. Thirteen diocesan priests concelebrated the Mass. Father Tommy Chen, of Sacred Heart Church in Hallettsville, was the master of ceremonies.

Dear Editor

The points on the errors of socialism from the **www.americaneedsfatima.org** website quoted in the last issue (P. 18) was a well-intentioned, but too narrow attempt to present Catholic social thought on a philosophy with a long and evolutionary history. **Socialism** is subject to various expressions that depend on the historical circumstances in which it has occurred. To understand them accurately, one must understand both socialism's origins and its growth as a movement. It does not always equate historically with "communism", nor can it be stated that all "socialists" have been or are "communists".

The Roman Catholic Encyclopedia states, "... modern Socialism is not a mere arbitrary exercise at state-building, but a deliberate attempt to relieve, on explicit principles, the existing social conditions, which are regarded as intolerable. The great inequalities of human life and opportunity, produced by the excessive concentration of wealth in the hands of a comparatively small section of the community," (description sound familiar?) "have been the cause and still are the stimulus of what is called the Socialistic movement." It should come as no surprise to informed Catholics that the ideas of socialism again have a chance to flourish in our current economic situation.

Thus, socialism is rooted in an attempt—however misguided—to correct social injustices that have been observed. But it does so on the basis of a solely materialistic solution with its limited view of the human person, which John Paul II noted both as bishop of Krakow and as Pope. Many popes address the same problems but on the basis of the Catholic concept of human life. The first encyclical in this vein was Pope Leo XIII's "Rerum Novarum: On the Condition of Workers" in 1891. In our own time, Blessed John Paul II also stated, "It may well be that materialism will prove to be a far more serious problem for the Church than was communism".

When we Roman Catholics fail to sow in our lives, the wisdom of one hundred years of teachings by Roman Pontiffs on economics and social justice (wheat), we can expect to reap what we sow in society (weeds). The warning of Jesus, "You cannot worship both God and money" rings true here. This year especially, Bethlehem and the Wise Men call us to reconsider our values system behind our economic choices and lifestyle. As we ponder the manger of the King born there as one of the economically oppressed poor of His day, let us ask ourselves the question, "Who or what do I really worship—i.e. for which I live and work?"

And it should come as no surprise that in Matthew 25, the eschatology of this Savior born in Bethlehem will proclaim that when He returns the Second time as Judge, he will do so on the basis of how we responded to the hungry, the homeless, the sick and the poor among us. May each of us live worthy of a place in His Kingdom of Love, Justice and Peace, now and forever.

Time to Celebrate!

ost of us love to have reasons to celebrate. Many of us who are in any way associated with Nazareth Academy in Victoria may not realize that we have a special reason to celebrate. On January 7, the Academy will be celebrating

145 years since the opening of "The Convent School" in 1867. The fifty-five students who were enrolled that year enjoyed the distinction of attending the only school in the area. To see how this dream became a reality, we need to backtrack to a few years earlier.

In 1865, Bishop Claude Marie Dubuis, the second Bishop of Galveston, included the entire state of


Texas, approached the Sisters of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament in Brownsville, Texas, and asked that they send some Sisters to Victoria to open a school. Now, the foundation in Brownsville, which had begun by four faith-filled Sisters from France in 1853, had endured many challenges and hardships - including extreme poverty, the ravages of the Civil War, yellow fever epidemics, and hurricanes. They could not see themselves sparing any Sisters for a new venture. After much prayer, they decided that if they could get some Sisters from Europe, they might be able to meet Bishop Dubuis' request. So Mother St. Claire Valentine, the superior, went alone to Europe to seek volunteers for the mission in Texas.

She was fortunate and gathered eight from France and four from Ireland. The eager group was given free passage on a warship and set sail toward their mission. I understand that the soldiers were very respectful to the Sisters even though it is reported that they were rather noisy at times. Unfortunately, the voyage came to an unhappy end for the Sisters when the ship arrived at Vera Cruz, Mexico. Their misfortune was two-fold: they missed the monthly ship from Vera Cruz to Texas, and except for Mother St. Claire, they all contracted yellow fever. As a result, four of the volunteers died before the party ever got to Texas. It was with a heavy heart that Mother St. Claire arrived in Brownsville with the survivors of the journey who immediately began the task of learning English to prepare themselves for bringing the Incarnate Word to the people of South Texas.

Providentially, the additional personnel would make the founding of a monastery and a school in Victoria a possibility. The Sisters held a community meeting and decided to respond affirmatively to Bishop Claude M. Dubuis' request. Five Sisters from Brownsville, including Mother St. Claire, Sister Paul Goux, Sister Mary Louise Murray, Sister Mary of the Cross Murray, and Sister Justine Fonvielle were chosen for the foundation in Victoria. They were joined by a novice, Sister Regis Chavassieux, who came directly from France; actually she arrived in Victoria ten days be-

fore the group from Brownsville arrived on December 21, 1866. While she was waiting, Sister Regis had been hosted by the mayor, Mr. Juan Linn.

The Sisters were warmly welcomed by the people and their pastor, Father Augustine Gardet. Father Gardet offered the Sisters his four-room house which had previously been the post *This was Father Gardet's house (formerly the post office)* office. The which served as the original Convent and School in Janu-Sisters didn't waste any time: Mother



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Everyone is Called to Live Virtuously

When I was growing up, I never

knew a priest prior to his ordination. My thought was priests are people who have always been priests and there's nothing else to them. But how wrong I was. Being at seminary helps us seminarians integrate the life of a priest and yet still



enjoy our personal hobbies, such as hunting, going to football and baseball games, etc. (However, with the Astros moving to the A.L., I think I'll start watching the new Sugar Land team.)

At seminary we do study theology, but we also work on just being Catholic. Even the lives of seminarians, who drop out and do not become priests, are forever changed because seminary teaches them how to live virtuously. Everyone is called to live a virtuous life; however, the life of a priest is to live this way exponentially. That is why I mentioned it is important for priests and seminarians to continue doing the things they enjoy. Being in public is a way to grow in virtue (and living in Hous-

ton makes it easier). If all we did was hide in the seminary or rectory, we could never grow in virtue. By getting out we have the chance to lead by example as Christ did. That is what life is all about and what everyone is called to do - to live and love like Christ.

Along with living as Christ did, there are also four major steps we take in the seminary prior to being ordained priests. First are installations as lector and acolyte, then being called as a candidate to the diaconate, and finally being ordained as a transitional deacon. On November 20, I was installed as an acolyte by Bishop Fellhauer at St. Mary Seminary. The job of the acolyte as described in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 65, states: "The acolyte is instituted to serve at the altar and to assist the priest and deacon. In particular it is for him to prepare the altar and the vessels and, as a special minister of the Eucharist, to give communion to the faithful." Those in my class, who received this ministry with me, are called to help prepare for the holy sacrifice of the Mass and to distribute Holy Communion when necessary. For me, it is very special because it's another visible step towards the reality of being ordained a priest.

Thank you for your continuous prayers and support for the seminarians of this diocese as we strive to become virtuous priests.


Congregation of Divine Providence celebrates 250th anniversary of founding

SAN ANTONIO—The Congregation of Divine Providence of San Antonio (CDP), along with six other Congregations that claim Blessed John Martin Moye as their founder or spiritual father, is planning a year-long celebration of the 250th anniversary of its institution. These Congregations of women religious trace their roots to 1762 France, when Father Moye sent young women into small villages to educate the poor. Celebrations will begin in January 2012, and will continue throughout the year. The Sisters of Divine Providence of San Antonio will host several events to recognize and honor the contributions of its Sisters, past and present.

Today, more than 3,000 Sisters of Divine Providence throughout the world continue to further the mission of the Church by responding to the spiritual and social needs of the times in Africa, Asia, Europe, and North and South America.

In 1866 two Sisters sailed to Texas to educate the children of immigrants. They established their first school in Austin but later settled in Castroville, Texas. Within twenty years the young band of Sisters grew and taught in more than twenty Texas schools. In 1886, however, the community was separated from its motherhouse in France.

The CDPs opened their first school



in San Antonio at St. Joseph Academy in 1875 and later moved the Congregation's headquarters to Our Lady of the Lake Convent in San Antonio. During their first hundred years in the U.S., they established or taught in more than 160 schools in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Missouri, Arkansas, California, and New Mexico.

In 1985, the Sisters of Divine Providence formed an Associates Program. They invited women and men to commit themselves to prayer and service by manifesting the charism and mission of the congregation in their daily lives, work, and prayer. In both Mexico and the United States, the CDP associates number almost 300 persons.

In the spirit of Blessed John Martin Moye and Mother St. Andrew Feltin, their Texas foundress, the San Antonio based community currently ministers in eight states in the U.S. and in Mexico. Strengthened by trust in the Providence of God, they continue to promote the common good of all creation. They bring God's loving care to others through prayer, administration, teaching, nursing, working with the poor, ministering in parishes, and offering pastoral care to the sick.

Percentage of Americans who are married reaches all-time low, Pew says

WASHINGTON (CNS) — With cohabitation, single-person households and single parenthood on the rise, the percentage of Americans who are currently married has reached an all-time low. A new report from the Pew Research Center analyzing Census Bureau data found that only 51 percent of Americans 18 and over were married in 2010, compared with 72 percent in 1960. Among Hispanics and African-Americans, the decline is even more steep. Fifty-five percent of white Americans were married in 2010, down from 74 percent 50 years earlier. But among Hispanics and blacks, married people are already in the minority. Forty-eight percent of Hispanics and 31 percent of African-Americans were married in 2010, compared with 72 percent and 61 percent, respectively, in 1960. The authors said it was "beyond the scope of this analysis to explain why marriage has declined," but they noted that its popularity has fallen less sharply among college graduates. The Pew report found that the median age at first marriage has been steadily rising for both men and women over the past five decades, from 22.8 for men and 20.3 for women in 1960. The median age in 2010 was 28.7 for men and 26.5 for women.

Last month Alicia Salinas from Eagle Lake called and asked if I could let readers know that her family, which is suffering financial hardship, was in need of a vehicle. She mentioned that she writes on the side, so I asked her to please write a "letter to the editor" stating her need.

Alicia, an Army veteran, and her husband, Javier, have three children who have autism, Ryan Casper 19, Kiernan Casper, 17, and Seth Salinas, 10, none of whom speak. One of the children requires breath-

ing treatments and is wheelchair bound.

The "letter" went in the December issue. The day *The Catholic Lighthouse* arrived at

the home of James and Janie Ryza, parishioners

of Holy Cross Parish in East Bernard, Janie spotted the letter and told James about it. It turns out that they were going to donate their used vehicle to a non-profit organization, which would then sell it to help finance the organization.

When James, a Vietnam War veteran, heard about Alicia's need and that she too was a veteran, it just spoke to his heart.

"This transaction was made possible," said James, "because of a blessing I received; therefore, I don't mind you printing it in the paper."

"I had an uncle and aunt, Joe and Martha Dybala from Fayetteville, who were far more in touch with God than I. Because of what I have learned from them, this all took place. They had also left me a little better off financially, which also helped," he continued.

"They had no children, and one day while I was sitting and talking with my uncle, we found out that we felt the same way, 'Today people go to church and talk about giving and helping those in need of help, but when we go to the polls, we forget about generosity," said James.

James said he went through life not really knowing his uncle and aunt very well because life is such a bustle and he felt he just didn't have time.

"I wish I had found more time because I know they could have taught me a lot more," he said, regretfully.

"I am afraid people are losing their way," James said. "God intended for us to help each other, not take advantage of each other."

"I attended a retreat and the thing of giving is what I would say is the problem people are experiencing. Someone told me the best way to preach this is to practice it, so this is my practice; it's my small religious act." The Salinas' and Ryzas met on Dec. 19, 2011, and went to the courthouse in Wharton to transfer the vehicle's title.

After the transaction took place, I called on the Salinas' to see how everything worked out. Alicia replied, "We just thank you very much" for organizing this. "It's going great; the van is beautiful. It's a 2003, and they took such good care of it. It runs beautifully and so smoothly."

God was surely working as the "agent" of this transaction, as the vehicle is a 2003 Ford Windstar Van – perfect for a family

with three children, one bound to a wheelchair.

Javier Salinas said he had a friend who had received a vehicle as a donation, but it was a little

rough and rusted. He was expecting the same but said even if it had been the same, it

would have still been a great blessing.
"When I saw the vehicle, I was looking

for the flaws, but realized it's like brand new. I just said to Alicia, 'Baby, it's brand new!'"

"They even put a brand new CD player

in it for us – just the day before they gave it to us," Javier said, "and they didn't even know I'm a musician – a bass player who used to play in various local bands."

"They were such a really nice couple (the Ryzas'), so blessed," Javier said. "You could tell they have Jesus in their hearts."

"People just don't understand autism and the destruction that comes with it," Javier explained to me. "We love our children who have autism. It's tough. We just don't give up, but a lot of people don't understand, even Christians." He explained that the children's behavior is very destructive and that he is constantly making repairs to their home.

"But blessings keep coming," he said.
"When we decided to put God first in our marriage, the blessings just began to flow."

Editor's Note: The Salinas' were also blessed by another reader. This reader had always wanted to give a donation to an active military member or a veteran, rather than to a large organization; when she saw the Salinas' letter, she thought this was perfect. I spoke with Alicia and she said she received the gift – a \$150 check! Thank you to M.E. for this kind blessing. 



March for Life

My father was the product of a marriage that lasted about five minutes. According to family lore, the ink wasn't dry on the marriage license before the d-word came up. The breach in his parents' marriage had a lasting effect on Dad. The healing came when he realized that God had called him into being despite the circumstances of his conception, despite the animosity that existed between his parents. Even though his parents' refusal to speak to one another lasted sixty years, Dad knew that God had a plan for him.

My sister and I are 10 ½ months apart in age. I wasn't in the plan – at least not the plan my parents had set into place. My mother was into her fifth month of pregnancy before she would wear maternity clothes or admit to anyone that another child was on the way.

I know how she felt. It's how I felt when my third child was born before the middle child was two and the older child was four. But my discomfiture went far beyond the spacing issues. The circumstances surrounding the conception are still painful and something I keep private. Bottom line, I did not want to be pregnant.

Talk about a long line of less-than-ideal conceptions. Dad. Me. My daughter. The world would probably give its nod to terminating any pregnancy conceived in these circumstances.

The world is wrong.

I learned about unconditional love from my father. He was the first and best example I have experienced of the love our Heavenly Father has for His children. As a Protestant pastor, Dad lived and shared the Gospel message. He was an evangelical with a heart for ecumenism. What a great combination! His suffering and death sent me on a journey that ended with my entry into Mother Church. He taught me to love God and follow Him – no matter where the journey took me.

Dad's life was a gift to everyone he met.

I am the mother of four children. At the age of 40, I entered the Catholic Church. To date, I have written articles for 43 diocesan newspapers, shared my conversion story with numerous parishes, been a guest on two EWTN programs, and been interviewed on so many radio shows that I have lost count. I have taught hundreds of students over the years. I continue to write,

Pope says Christians look to New Year with hope, commitment to peace

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Christians should look toward the New Year with hope and a commitment to working for justice and peace, Pope Benedict XVI said.

"God is love, he is just and peaceable, and anyone wishing to honor him must first of all act like a child following his father's example," the pope said Jan. 1 during a Mass marking the feast of Mary, Mother of God and World Peace Day.

The pope ended 2011 by celebrating an evening prayer service Dec. 31 in the basilica and offering God thanks for the past year. The next morning, he celebrated Mass in St. Peter's and recited the Angelus with visitors gathered in St. Peter's Square.

He told the crowd in the square that thanks to Mary's openness to God's will, "the true light that illuminates every human being appeared and the path to peace was reopened."

"I invite all of you to join me in praying earnestly for peace throughout the world, for reconciliation and forgiveness in areas of conflict, and for a more just and equitable distribution of the world's resources," he said.

Earlier, during his homily at Mass, the pope said Jesus' birth changed human history, filling it with hope and promise.

"He is the mercy and the peace that the world, of itself, cannot give, and which it needs at least as much as bread," the pope said.

For World Peace Day 2012 (Jan. 1), Pope Benedict focused on the theme of educating young people in justice and peace.

"In the face of the shadows that obscure the horizons of today's world, to assume responsibility for educating young people in knowledge of the truth, in fundamental values and virtues, is to look to the future with hope," the pope said.

With the ease of communications, travel and globalization, he said, the world seems smaller in many ways and people come into contact more often with others from a different race, religion or culture.

"Now, more than ever, it is indispensable to learn the importance and the art of peaceful coexistence, mutual respect, dialogue and understanding," he said. While young people naturally

While young people naturally are open, the pope said they often are targets of manipulation by those who are intolerant and violent, so "a solid education of their consciences" is important.

Education begins in the family, which must help children "develop a personality that combines a profound sense of justice with respect for their neighbor, with a capacity to address conflicts without arrogance, with the inner strength to bear witness to good, even when it involves sacrifice, with forgiveness and reconciliation," Pope Benedict said.

Religious leaders must contribute to the process as well, he said, because "every pathway of authentic religious formation guides the person, from the most tender age, to know God, to love him and do his will."

At the evening prayer service New Year's Eve, the pope said most people look toward a new year "with some trepidation," with desires and expectations. But the changing of the civic calendar so soon after Christmas helps Christians recognize the purpose of their lives and look with confidence to the future.

"From within the fabric of humanity, rent asunder by so much injustice, wickedness and violence, there bursts forth in an unforeseen way the joyful and liberating novelty of Christ our savior, who leads us to contemplate the goodness and tenderness of God," the pope said.

"There is no more room for anxiety in the face of time that passes, never to return," he said. "Now there is room for unlimited trust in God, by whom we know we are loved, for whom we live and to whom our life is directed."

Pope advances sainthood causes of Marianne Cope, Kateri Tekakwitha

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Pope Benedict XVI advanced the sainthood causes of Blessed Marianne Cope of Molokai and Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. He also formally recognized the martyrdom of 64 victims of the Spanish Civil War and advanced the causes of 18 other men and women. During a meeting Dec. 19 with Cardinal Angelo Amato, prefect of the Congregation for Saints' Causes, the pope signed the decrees recognizing the miracles needed for the canonizations of Blesseds Marianne and Kateri. Before a date is set

for the canonization ceremonies, there must be an "ordinary public consistory," a formal ceremony opened and closed with prayer, during which cardinals present in Rome express their support for the pope's decision to create new saints. Blessed Marianne, who worked as a teacher and hospital administrator in New York, spent the last 30 years of her life ministering on the Hawaiian island of Molokai to those with leprosy. She died on the island in 1918 at age 80 and was beatified in St. Peter's Basilica in 2005. Blessed Kateri, known as the

Lily of the Mohawks, was born to a Christian Algonquin mother and a Mohawk father in 1656 in upstate New York along the Mohawk River. She was baptized by a Jesuit missionary in 1676 when she was 20, and she died in Canada four years later. In June 1980, she became the first Native American to be beatified.

endeavors to discover, collect, preserve, and publish historical material relating to the Catholic community in Texas and the Southwest.



Bishops join others in lauding new EPA toxins rule

WASHINGTON (CNS) — The head of the U.S. bishops' Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development joined with others in praising a new federal rule to cut down on the amount of toxins emitted from coal- and oil-fired plants. "It just makes good sense to want to have clean air for our children and families to breathe and for future generations," said a statement by Bishop Stephen E. Blaire of Stockton, Calif., issued Dec. 21, the date the new EPA rules on toxins were unveiled. "Children, inside and outside the womb, are uniquely vulnerable to environmental hazards and exposure to toxic pollutants in the environment," he said. "Their bodies, behaviors and size leave them more exposed than adults to such health hazards." The EPA rule, which has been in the works since 1990, is intended to cut mercury, arsenic and other toxins by up to 90 percent by 2016, the year the rule would be fully implemented. The rule is expected to eliminate among other things, 11,000 premature deaths and 130,000 cases of asthma a year. EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson, at a Dec. 21 news conference at the Children's National Medical Center in Washington, said that \$9

Former Episcopal bishop to head new US ordinariate for ex-Anglicans

WASHINGTON (CNS) - Pope Benedict XVI has established a U.S. ordinariate for former Anglicans who wish to become Catholics and named a married former Episcopal bishop to head it. The Personal Ordinariate of the Chair of St. Peter - functionally equivalent to a diocese, but national in scope - will be based at a parish in Houston and will be led by Father Jeffrey N. Steenson, the former Episcopal bishop of the Rio Grande who was ordained a Catholic priest of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, N.M., in February 2009. The establishment of the ordinariate and the naming of its first leader were announced by the Vatican Jan. 1. More than 100 former Anglican priests have applied to become Catholic priests in the ordinariate and 1,400 individuals from 22 communities have expressed interest in joining. The website for the new ordinariate is www.usordinariate.org.

"Children are uniquely vulnerable to environmental hazards and exposures to toxic chemicals in the environment," said a U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops issue brief written earlier this year. "Exposure to air pollutants and toxins is significantly more harmful to children, born and unborn. Children in poverty and children of color are at a disproportionate risk, with routinely higher rates of lead poisoning and asthma-related deaths and hospitalization," it added.

Prague archbishop remembers Havel as friend, 'fellow prisoner'

PRAGUE (CNS) — Calling former Czech President Vaclav Havel a "friend and fellow prisoner," the president of the Czech bishops' conference said the entire nation owes Havel a debt of gratitude for its freedom and the new flourishing of Czech life and culture. Archbishop Dominik Duka of Prague, who was imprisoned with Havel by the communists, asked that the bells of all Catholic churches in the Czech Republic ring at 6 p.m. Dec. 18 in memory of the former president who died that morning at the age of 75. The archbishop, who met Havel in prison in 1981 and continued to meet with him after the end of communism in 1989, was scheduled to celebrate Havel's funeral Mass Dec. 23 in St. Vitus Cathedral. "He knew the loss of freedom, the denial of human dignity, oppression and imprisonment," Archbishop Duka said in a statement posted Dec. 18 on the Czech bishops' website. "I am convinced that everyone across the country, regardless of political or religious beliefs, owes him honor and thanks." Havel, a playwright and essayist, was one of the founders of the Charter 77 movement, which began criticizing the communist government of then-Czechoslovakia, particularly for its lack of respect for human rights, in 1977. He served four years of hard labor and nine months in prison for dissident activities before becoming head of state after the 1989 "Velvet Revolution" that toppled communism. He resigned in 1992 when Slovakia declared its independence, but was elected president of the Czech Republic six months later.



Haitian quake survivors leaving camps for a place they can call home

WASHINGTON (CNS) — It took lmost two years, but Haitian earthquake survivor Sonya Mallebranche has a place she can call home again. It's only three rooms, making it less than perfect, Mallebranche admits, especially for four adults and three toddler grandchildren. But Mallebranche, 51, finds it far better than living in a tattered tent in the fetid, dusty camp known as Petite Place Cazeau alongside hundreds of others displaced by the powerful Jan. 12, 2010, earthquake that leveled much of the region around Port-au-Prince. "I'm so much more comfortable. Now I can sleep peacefully. Now I have my family with me," Mallebranche told Catholic News Service Jan. 5 via cell phone from her new home. "I am really happy to have that house," she said through a translator. Mallebranche's family was among 460 families that have moved from the camp into long-term housing since November under a pilot program initiated by Catholic Relief Services, the U.S. bishops' overseas relief and development agency. Called Ann Ale Lakay, Creole for Let's Go Home, the program is designed to address a variety of needs in addition to long-term housing

by preparing camp dwellers frustrated by months of living in squalid conditions for a return to some sense of normalcy. The program incorporates two professional psychologists and 12 social workers to guide earthquake survivors in resolving conflict, managing money and overcoming the sense of loss that lingers two years after disaster disrupted their lives. "We realized there was a lot of fear about moving out of the camps, about restarting their lives after the earthquake," explained Luke King, CRS country director in Haiti. "People were concerned about how to go about returning to a normal life."

US bishops to study 50-state approach to immigration at Utah conference

SALT LAKE CITY (CNS) A three-day conference on issues faced by Catholic advocates of comprehensive immigration reform is scheduled for Jan. 11-13 in Salt Lake City. The conference is sponsored by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Catholic Legal Immigration Network. The conference's title, "Immigration – A 50-State Issue: A Focus on State and Local Immigration Initiatives," reflects the USCCB's position that immigration is a federal issue, said Bishop John C. Wester of Salt Lake City. He said the conference is a wonderful opportunity for the diocese. "Anytime anything of that size comes in here, it gives us a platform to once again speak of the important immigration issues to our people," he told the Intermountain Catholic, Salt Lake City's diocesan newspaper. Remembering the Holy Family

We are given to many meditations during the Advent and Christmas seasons; several involve how Gospel narratives can be applied to circumstances today. One of the most profound involves the Holy Family's struggles in the Nativity gospels and the plight facing contemporary migrant families.

This connection across time is not as arbitrary as some political leaders may wish. Diaspora and migration - and the hardships and uncertainties that accompany them – are ubiquitous themes throughout the Bible. Above all, the story of the Holy Family has become something of an archetype for refugee families throughout history. As related in the Gospel of Matthew, Mary and Joseph are pilgrims to Bethlehem – without shelter or support - who are forced to give birth to the infant Jesus in a humble stable. Soon after, the new family must escape to Egypt to avoid King Herod's edict for infanticide of newborns to thwart future challenges to his rule. The new parents were refugees, fleeing their homeland to seek safety and sustenance in another land and praying that their fellows there would show them kindness and mercy.

The Nativity is a powerful story. Surely, it is not merely coincidence that the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops plans the observance of National Migration Week (January 8 through 14) so quickly after Christmas. As it has for the past 25 years, this year's National Migration Week celebration seeks to guide Catholics to grasp the Church's transnational diversity and better understand the plight of migrants searching for better lives or fleeing persecution, war, or violence. Such a humble and inspiring story still resonates so clearly as a religious meme that it serves to encourage all Catholics to open our hearts and homes to migrant

across the border. Who among us would not share such dreams? The failure of federal officials to embrace fair and comprehensive immigration reform, coupled with a history of inconsistent

U.S. border enforcement, has led to exploitation of migrant families and simmering frustration across the country.

The Catholic Church has long argued that this situation is unacceptable. Jesus taught (and America's founders embraced) that every human being has Godgiven, universal, and inalienable rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Implied within those rights is the natural right to emigrate, since securing life's necessities may require relocating elsewhere - provided you abide by the laws and sustain the community to which you move. Such freedom pervades the Gospels, with Jesus guiding his followers through a traveling ministry that was sustained by the generosity of the communities they visited.

Such is our role as people of


faith: to provide succor for those brethren seeking better lives, to ensure that our neighbors are willing to explore an open and honest dialogue about the complex issues of migration, and
